Parish and Town Visions

Brinkworth: We wish to develop and sustain an accessible, cohesive, peaceful, clean, safe and attractive village that is inclusive to all ages and stages and which is consistent with our rural history, minimising the loss of traditional farming activities and their replacement with suitable alternative activities; it should also fully recognise the unique length and scattered nature of Brinkworth as a ribbon development.

Brokenborough: We are a small and fragmented parish, the centre of which is the quiet hamlet of Brokenborough. Farmland borders the parish on all sides, along with historic sites such as the Fosse Way. The Church and pub are at the centre of the community.

Charlton: We benefit from an active village community seeking to maintain and develop a variety of facilities and activities within a rural environment.

Crudwell: We wish to develop and sustain a clean, safe and attractive area that is inclusive to all ages and stages, is consistent with our history and fully recognises the rural nature of Crudwell and its outlying hamlets.

Dauntsey: We are a very rural village having a population of approximately 400 people. Historically, we are a widespread village which was split even more by the M4. In recent years, we have seen a regeneration of the



village with two successful cricket clubs, a thriving school and a good community feeling. The opening of the new school hall, which is to be available to community groups is a much needed facility which will improve this cohesion.

Easton Grey: Our mission statement is to maintain the rural community feeling of the village and to ensure that the largest possible part of the population is made up of full-time residents.

Great Somerford: To maintain Great Somerford as a working village that is peaceful, safe, clean, attractive and accessible. To encourage development that is consistent with, and enhances its rural character. To support the growth of the village school as an important part of village life.

Hankerton: We wish to maintain the rural friendly feel and good quality of life enjoyed by the community and to keep the village safe and peaceful. We hope that people of all ages feel welcome and supported by the community.

Little Somerford: To maintain

the essential attributes that make Little Somerford a peaceful, safe, clean, attractive and accessible village. To encourage development that is consistent with, and enhances its rural character.

Lea and Cleverton: Our mission statement is to maintain a good quality and standard of life for the residents of the Parish by maintaining and enhancing the preservation of the rural amenity of the area. Taking account of and encouraging the appreciation of the past history and blending with the need to fulfil the requirements of the existing and future community; also seeking to encourage greater participation in local affairs by Parishioners.

Luckington and Alderton:

We want to be sure that all our people, of all ages, have a good quality of life, enjoying a supportive community and an attractive environment.

Malmesbury: Working together to improve the quality of life for all in Malmesbury and the

surrounding villages.

Norton and Foxley: Maintain the friendliness and community spirit as a key feature of the rural communities of Norton and Foxley. Work together to improve local facilities and to protect the local heritage.

Oaksey: The village has a strong sense of community and a wide social mix of residents. An ability to identify specific needs and then to fundraise to achieve them has resulted in many improvements to our village life. We have an active Youth Club run by volunteers, a Women's Institute, an enthusiastic Church choir, a committed Parent Teacher Association, and Cricket and Football clubs.

Sherston: To maintain and develop a welcoming sustainable involved and vibrant rural community which fully appreciates and conserves its history and natural beauty. **Sopworth:** This is a small, happy village with a good

community spirit.

St Paul Malmesbury Without:

Our vision is the achievement of a safe and pleasant environment in which to live and work. In particular, to reduce the adverse impact that traffic on the A429 has on the safety and quality of life of the whole parish. We also seek to maintain the beauty of the countryside and villages whilst at the same time improving housing, education and health facilities for all.

Introduction to the Community Plan




In 2000, the government placed a responsibility on local authorities to find ways of engaging more closely with the communities they exist to serve. Working in partnership through a body called the Wiltshire Strategic Board, the Councils across Wiltshire have responded by developing a strategy entitled 'A County fit for our children'. At a district level, there is a local strategic partnership which will address common issues emerging from the five community areas across North Wiltshire.

A community plan forms a fundamental part of this new initiative. The main emphasis is on developing a partnership approach to local governance and of finding ways to use local government resources in a more cost effective and responsive manner.

Community plans are also an attempt to stimulate and broaden the current local government consultation processes within a manageable geographical area. Information on the future social, economic and environmental aspirations and needs of those who live in the towns and villages within each of Wiltshire's 20 community areas will be drawn

not just from plans developed by Parish and Town Councils, but also from the inputs invited directly from local businesses, service providers, voluntary organisations, faith communities, youth representatives, school councils and interested members of the public.

All of this information is grouped together under specific headings to allow it to be viewed from a much wider perspective and to enable the various requirements to be addressed at a geographical community area, rather than just at Parish level. For Malmesbury, this geographical area is known as 'Area 1' and North Wiltshire District Council involves local people in local decisions and allocates funding for local projects through the Area 1 Committee.

The community plan will be 'owned' by local people via the 'Malmesbury and Villages
Community Area Partnership'; this body is the means by which information is gathered for the plan and achievement monitored. The group comprises volunteers who represent many of the sectors of the community referred to above and representatives from the Parish and Town Councils.

This is the first issue of the Malmesbury and Villages

Community Plan and is the result of much effort by many people who have given generously of their time and much consultation and feedback from the local community, including those who attended the visioning event in May 2004. As you turn the pages, you will see detailed the most pressing needs, concerns and aspirations of the various parishes, together with information on the action being taken or intended.

We recognise too that there are many active voluntary and community groups that already achieve a great deal in the area and that these will continue to do so.

All of this is in the public domain and thus gives high visibility to what is being done on behalf of us all by those who serve the community in the role of Parish, District or County Councillors. And perhaps, just as importantly, it will enable the progress being made to be more easily monitored and reported on. This plan is meant to be a living and dynamic document; it will be reviewed and updated as necessary. Anyone can join the Partnership and there will be an Annual General Meeting each year to which the public are warmly invited.

We all very much welcome this new initiative and strongly commend it to you. Do please find the time to read this plan and to see what is going on. Hopefully, you will be pleasantly surprised.

Sopworth

What we value about the village:

- · There are many village events, mostly utilising the village hall (recently refurbished thanks largely to voluntary time and money)

What we value now and wish to keep

- · Our community and the spaces it uses: the shop, village halls, playing fields, churches and public house
- · Our pre school and primary school which provide a focus and a future for the village and can become a centre for learning for all ages
- · The green spaces within and around the village; the pond in Alderton and the network of public footpaths that connect residents with our rural identity

Easton Grey

Features of the village:

- · Small hamlet type village with neither shop nor pub but well supported by the facilities in the neighbouring larger villages, notably Sherston. Malmesbury is only 3 miles away with its much more extensive choice of retail outlets
- Village has a church and is also a very social community with many children, most of whom attend primary school in Sherston
- Enthusiastic Neighbourhood Watch scheme
- · Emphasis on the upkeep of the rights of way network in the parish

Apart from some small extensions to existing properties, there is little opportunity for new dwellings in view of the lack of additional infrastructure and the need to maintain the existing ambience of the village, most of which is in the conservation area

Malmesbury

What we value in Malmesbury:

- · Community spirit and the friendliness of the people
- · Malmesbury's proud heritage, historic buildings and unique hillton location
- Self-sufficient a wide range and good mix of shops and services, servicing not only the town but a large rural area
- A proper working town not a dormitory for commuters, which welcomes and works for sustainable tourism

- A tolerant, socially inclusive community which wants to balance conservation with the need to plan sensibly and sustainably for future generations

Sherston

Valued services and facilities:

- Vibrant community
- · Retail shops, post office and public houses

- · Village hall and churches
- New children's playground and skateboard park
- Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty
- Historic conservation area
- Local employment and business opportunities

Hullavington

- · Our local amenities ie the shop, post office, pub, garage, village newspaper, village website, school, coal yard, farms etc

- Maintain police presence and enforce speed limits
- The independence of village life
- · Our existing facilities such as pubs, shops, community meeting places, the bus service, country pathways, parks and nature reserves with the will to maintain and improve them
- The sense of community and the community safety
- The opportunity for further development at the former Lucent site

Norton and Foxley

- · Byways and public footpaths it is important to ensure access to these at all times for use by ramblers and horse riders
- Public telephone boxes the boxes in both villages are very important as mobile reception is not good. The box outside the pub, which has been given a two year reprieve, is used a great deal

- · The footpaths are generally maintained and well used
- · The area is peaceful with virtually no vandalism
- Nearby we have meadows of Special Scientific Interest now belonging to the Wiltshire Wildlife Trust

Charlton

The village benefits from:

- · having a well-used and well-supported village hall
- a small playground area owned and maintained by the Village Hall Committee
- · a part-time post office facility and would wish to retain this asset
- a beautiful 12th Century church that is important to retain both as an historic building and as a place for those that wish to worship there
- · the Horse and Groom public house which is a good focal point for the community
- the noticeboards and Parish newsletter which aid communication
